President Barb King opened the meeting by welcoming the membership and the guest speakers. The Executive Board members were introduced. The past presidents were asked to stand and introduce themselves. She reminded the membership that NEORQC is celebrating its 35th anniversary year. Several events are planned for the celebration during this year.

The minutes from the June 3rd, 2023 General Meeting was presented by President Barb King. A motion was made and seconded to approve the minutes without changes. Motion carried.

Treasurer's Report | Mary Rose Norquist, Treasurer

Treasurer Mary Rose Nordquist presented the treasurer's report. Balance of the checking account as of September 30, 2023 was \$9,276.88. The savings account balance as of September 30, 2023 was \$8,590.33. A motion was made then seconded to approve the Treasurers Report. Motion carried. The treasurer's report was filed for audit.

There were 25 guilds (85 individuals) represented at the general meeting. Each guild provided updates on the guild's activities and any upcoming events.

Membership Update | Linda Roberto, Membership

Currently the organization consists of 41 guilds, 1,452 members, 15 teachers, and 19 shops. A new guild and shop joined NEORQC at the meeting. The shop was Hidden Stitches located in Broadview Heights.

Grants | Cathy Parker, Grants Chair

The 2023 Education Grants recipients Tuscarawas County 4-H, Ohio Star Guild, Calico Hearts, and Girl Scouts of NE Ohio presented their projects funded through the grant awards. The Tuscarawas County Quilt Day grant provided 4H members the ability to learn sewing skills to make quilts. The Ohio Star Guild hosted a Kids Quilt Camp where the membership worked with kids on making quilts through teaching basic quilt skills. The Calico Hearts worked with Girl Scout Troop #91510 to teach basic sewing skills and

the girl scouts made cross- over bags. Memory Makers and Quilters with a Heart guilds had two sewing sessions with the NE Girl Scouts. The Girl Scouts made quilt blocks and cross-over bags. Two quilts were made by volunteers with the practice pieces the girl scouts made to familiarize themselves with the machines. These quilts were donated and presented to the NE Ohio Girl Scout Council at the meeting.

- **General Meeting Location** a discussion was held on rather to have a permanent location (like the location we were meeting at) for all meetings that will be hosted by

a guild or to continue to move the meetings based on the hosting guild location. Membership had mixed feelings; some liked a permanent location and others voiced that far away guilds might not come to Kent. The Akron/Canton area is the center of the NEORQC region. The Board will continue to discuss and get feedback from guilds.

Speaker Presentation The Beginning and History of NEORQC - Cindy Casciato and Carol Wooten, founding members

Cindy and Carole shared how NEORQC was founded. It started as a network for quilters 35 years ago before the internet and all the current guilt shops and classes that are available to us today. Cindy was the first president of the organization. They created a quilting network that has grown over the 35 years. The quilting revolution began in 1979 with the cutting mat, ruler, and rotary cutter which Olfa created. The concept for NEORQC was presented by Cindy Casciato at a Quilters Tea hosted by Country Piecemakers in Atwater in May 1988. She saw a need for guilters to get together in a "networking" format that would benefit everyone. There were only two quilt shops in 1988, new ideas were not shared, and a regional guilting group didn't exist. Following an invitation to quilting organizations throughout northeast Ohio, 32 women met at the home of Carole in August 1988 to begin planning. NEORQC was officially organized in March 1989. The Northcoast Needlers hosted the first meeting in March when five officers were elected, and bylaws were passed. The officers were Chairperson Cindy Casciato of Calico Hearts; Secretary Carole J. Wooten of Common Threads; Treasurer Mary Lou Hall of Ohio Star Quilters; Newsletter Editor Mary Huey of Erie Street Fabrics, and Directory Chair Gayle Pritchard of Northcoast Needlers. The organization started with 14 guilds with about 600 members and two shops. Dues were 25 cents per member. Carol shared in 1996, NEORQC participated in the Cleveland Bicentennial celebration by being part of a hardbound resource book of community organizations. A copy of the book was included in a time capsule (casket) that was buried and which will be unearthed in 2096. A description of the NEORQC mission, membership requirements and other information about NEORQC was printed in the book. Cindy and Carole showed some early quilts from the beginning and different quilts presenting the changes in fabric and techniques throughout the years.

Show and Tell

There were numerous show and tell projects shared by the membership. Two members both won \$10 gift cards for their show and tell.
